Colony Governor's Message for May 3, 2025

The first non-Mayflower passenger to serve as Governor was **Thomas Prence**, who arrived on the *Fortune* in 1621. Prence was the second longest serving Plymouth Governor at 20 years (William Bradford was first at 30 years). He quickly became active in colonial affairs and was known for his strong religious beliefs and leadership abilities. Prence was a devout Puritan and enforced stricter religious policies, including cracking down on Quakers and other dissenters.

By his marriage to Patience Brewster, daughter of Elder William and Mary Brewster, Prence was very much a part of the *Mayflower* family. After Patience's death in 1634, he married 3 more times to Mary Collier, Aphia Quick and Mary (?).

His daughter Elizabeth, whose mother was either Mary Collier or Aphia Quick, put his rigid beliefs to the test. Elizabeth Prence married Arthur Howland, Jr., son of Arthur Howland, John Howland's brother; both Howlands were Quakers. As a result of their marriage, Prence disinherited his daughter, in spite of which Elizabeth still had many descendants.

Our *Mayflower Chronicles* editor descends from William Bradford and your Colony Governor descends from Thomas Prence, through his daughter Elizabeth (Prence) Howland.



Albany Colony Remembers Arthur F. Young, Jr.

May 1929—January 2025

The Mayflower Society—especially Albany Colony—lost a beloved member and significant leader early this year: Colony Elder Arthur F. Young, Jr., of Delmar, who joined the New York State Mayflower Society in 1990, passed away this past January.



Art was our Lieutenant Governor from 1995 until 2003, and he became Albany Colony Elder in May, 2017. He was our Colony Director, Elder, and former Governor, and Director and Elder of the NYS Society. His children are all members of Albany Colony: Susan McCormick, of North Greenbush, Elizabeth Waidelich, of Salt Lake City, Utah, and David A. Young of Ravena, who is our current 2nd Deputy Colony Governor. Art's wife, Anne, has been a faithful attendee at our Colony Luncheon Meetings.

In January, Justin Abelow, Governor of New York Colony, on behalf of the Board of Assistants, provided members with the following rather astonishing compilation in an email message (slightly edited here to conserve space):

"Art was dedicated to country and community, believing in service to others and belonging to many non-profit organizations throughout the Capital District . . . including: CDTA Board member for 20 years; President of the J.O. Wells Albany Memorial Hospital Nursing Education Foundation; Director, Elder and former Governor of the Albany Colony of Mayflower Descendants; Sons of the American Revolution member; Sons of Union Veterans of the Civil War member; President and Director of the Elder William Brewster Society; Director and Treasurer of the Capital District Pop Warner Federation; Junior Chamber International member; Pilgrim John Holland Society member; Thomas Stanton Society member; Founders of Jamestown Society member . . . Director and Chairman of Adirondack Swimming, a U.S. Swimming member, a 40-year Certified Swim Official for High School and College swimming, a Deck Official at four Olympic trials, and was recently inducted into the Adirondack Swimming Hall of Fame.

"In addition to Art's volunteer activities, he had strong civic and political interests, and was heavily involved in the local and county Republican political organizations for more than 20 years."

Colony Governor Emeritus Stephen Madsen offered the following message: "Seeing Art Young was always one of my favorite parts of meetings of the Board of Assistants of the New York Mayflower Society. Art served for many years as both the Elder of the New York State Society and the Elder of the Society's Albany Colony... always an active participant in our State Society meetings, bringing his wise perspective to our various deliberations.

"His dedication to the Society's mission of maintaining the memory and values of the Pilgrims was perhaps best shown by the fact that he faithfully attended meetings of the State Society in New York City, taking the train down from Albany to New York . . . for every meeting even when he had reached an advanced age and travel had become challenging for him. . .

"He was a wonderful man, exemplifying the faithfulness, hardiness and intrepidity of the Pilgrims. He will be deeply missed, and fondly remembered..."

Your *Chronicles* Editor and any other descendants of William Bradford share a minor connection with Art Young as very distant cousins! Art was descended from <u>Alice Carpenter Southworth and her first husband, Edward</u>, while Bradford's descendants are from his <u>second marriage to Alice Southworth in 1623</u>. As you probably know, Bradford's first wife, Dorothy, died in a fall from the Mayflower while still in Plymouth Harbor in 1620. When he got word a couple of years later that Alice, his former sweetheart, had been widowed, he sent for her to come from England to be with him, and the rest is history!

At our upcoming Spring Luncheon Meeting on May 3rd, Art Young's son, 2nd Deputy Albany Colony Governor David A. Young, will accept in his father's honor the 35-year Membership Longevity Certificate that Art was entitled to receive in 2025.







Minutes of the November 2, 2024 Meeting Albany Colony, Society of Mayflower Descendants

The **Fall Compact Day Meeting** of the Albany Colony, SOMD, was held at the Albany Country Club, 300 Wormer Road, Voorheesville, New York on Saturday, November 2nd. The meeting was called to order by Colony Gov. David W. Morton at 12:30 p.m. The Invocation was given by Elder Arthur F. Young, Jr., followed by the Pledge of Allegiance of the Flag of the United States of America led by 1st Colony Deputy Gov. & Co-Captain Douglass (Tim) Mabee. The Mayflower Compact was read by Co-Captain Priscilla Davis.

Note that a quorum was present. A motion was made by Art Young, seconded by Lisa O'Brien to ratify the actions of our officers, committees and our society since our last regular meeting that was held on May 4, 2024. **The motion was approved.**

Old Business:

Meeting House Tray - Colony Gov. Morton displayed the Meeting House Tray that the Albany Colony received in recognition of the \$1,000 donation that was made to support the preservation efforts of the Mayflower Meeting House in Plymouth, Massachusetts and read the thank you notes that were received from the General Society. A discussion ensued to determine what we should do with the tray. At this time, it was decided that the tray would remain as property of the Albany Colony, and it will reside with the current Historian/Archivist.

Voting for May Meeting Venue — Colony Gov. Morton requested Victoria Young to distribute a ballot that included several venue choices to be considered for the next meeting that will be held on Saturday, May 3, 2025. The members voted and the ballots were tabulated. The next meeting will be in Cobleskill, New York.

New Business:

Officer Candidates for 2025-2028 Term of Office – Colony Gov. Morton appointed Sylvia Magin to serve on the Nominating Committee and requested that all candidates notify her of their intention to serve as an officer for the next three-year term 2025-2028.

Motion #1: A motion was made by Paul Johnson, seconded by Helen Rees to make a \$25.00 donation to the Education Committee of the General Mayflower Society in the name of each recently deceased Albany Colony Member. Two (2) donations in the names of Brian Cook, and Lynne Byron will be sent by the Albany Colony Treasurer to the General Mayflower Society. Total expenditure will be \$50.00. The motion was approved.

Program: "Protecting New York Legacy at Peebles Island State Park" presented by Sara Center, a William Bradford Descendent and granddaughter of Chronicles Editor Sylvia Magin.

The Peebles Island Resource Center, located in Peebles Island State Park, is a scenic, 158-acre green space at the confluence of the Hudson and Mohawk Rivers. Established in 1972, the Bureau of Historic Sites provides technical support to New York's state-owned parks and thirty-six (36) historic sites. Headquartered at the Peebles Island Resource Center, a rehabilitated factory complex, with over 3,000,000 objects in their collection, the bureau helps to safeguard New York's rich heritage through a variety of projects and programs that document, preserve, and interpret historic, cultural, and natural resources at state parks and historic sites.

During her presentation, Sara highlighted the responsibilities of the Collection Management Bureau that oversees the 36 historic sites throughout New York State. These include managing the acquisitions paperwork, loan agreements, currier service to and from sites, storage of items that belong to the individual historic sites, deaccessioning of items and digitization of items. Approximately 5% of the one million items in the collection are currently being displayed, so this new digitization program will allow the public to view the remaining 95% of items that may never have been available to be viewed by the public. To close the program, Sara shared her favorite experiences while working in the Collections Management Bureau. These included handling a document signed by George Washington, dated 1776 and transporting President Grant's robe from Peebles Island to the Grant Cottage so it could be put on display for a special exhibition.

At the conclusion of the program, Colony Gov. Morton thanked Jim Pratt for his technical support making this presentation possible and for offering to video the program so it can be uploaded to the Colony Website.

Meeting adjourned at 2:40 p.m.

found in the Minutes of the Fall Meeting, as well as on our Colony websites.










Mayflower Heritage Tour

12 Day Tour to England and the Netherlands Helen K. B. Rees

The General Society of Mayflower Descendants (GSMD) annually offers a tour throughout Holland and England, organized by Feat Travel. With local historians as our guides we traveled by bus, canal boats and ferry as we followed the trail of our Pilgrim ancestors as they fled from England to Holland, and then back again from 1608 to 1620, in an effort to escape religious persecution.

In September my husband and I flew to Amsterdam several days early, so that we would be over the jet lag and be ready for our tour. We also enjoyed a bit of leisurely time in Amsterdam to see some of the sites, like the Maritime Museum and the Rijksmuseum, both of which I would recommend but which were not part of the official tour

itinerary.

Our tour days were packed with visits to landmarks, historic homes, relevant churches as well as special Pilgrim archives. This trip

focused not only on individual Pilgrims, but also on the massive religious sociopolitical movement behind this pivotal immigration. Walking through jails, courtrooms, launch sites, cobblestone streets, related textile industries and country churches, all generated in-depth discussions on Pilgrim life. An unexpected connection was the realization that Rembrandt and Shakespeare were contemporaries of the Pilgrims and lived in areas where they lived, at Leiden's Memorial Park with the same time. It appeared that Rembrandt lived on the same street as Mary Chilton when they were both children in Leiden, so it would be logical

to assume that they knew each other and may even have played together. An unexpected thought.

The tour's arrangements covered lovely historic inns and hotels as well as more traditional ones. A series of knowledgeable local guides provided specialized knowledge of each area we visited and often knew the secrets to good eating establishments! The understanding of the historic and tumultuous times that the Pilgrims

lived in, as well as some of the

lesser-known stories about their adventures, made this trip especially memorable for me.

I also feel that I have a much better handle on the Pilgrims' actual history as well as the genetic traits that allowed them to survive their travails. Their determination and persistence allowed them to finally reach the new world and to survive that first winter. This appears to be a trait that has passed down through various Mayflower family trees, as most of the 26 members of our tour were members of the Mayflower Society. So it was a

determined and persevering group that faced climbing to the top of windmills and churches, and also lugging suitcases to upper floors in historic inns without elevators.

The vigorous itinerary followed the Pilgrims' trail but it also took advantage of being close to other English sites that were appropriately historic, such as Anne Hathaway's cottage, London Tower and Windsor Castle. An obvious effort was made to provide a real understanding for each local area as we visited locations where the Pilgrims had traveled. We ended our tour in London and enjoyed a delicious farewell dinner at a 400-year-old restaurant next to the Pilgrims' London departure port.

As one of our California Mayflower descendants said, "The quality of the guides, hotels, dining, and access to related sites belies the reasonable cost of the trip. This tour is highly recommended for anyone with any British ancestry or interest in history."
